History of Lillian United Methodist Church

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The First Decade: Charter & Construction

Our history begins in 1979 when Minnie Lee Pritchett came to Lillian to live with her daughter and son-in-law, Bob and Charlotte Donnenwirth. After finding that there was not a Methodist Church close by, she insisted Bob drive her to church every Sunday in Foley. Then one Sunday as they were leaving The First Methodist Church of Foley, Bob said to Rev. Robert Moore ... "Rev. Moore, this is a long way to drive, I wish we had a Methodist church in Lillian." Rev. Moore shook hands, smiled and said nothing. The next day, Bob came home from work and to his surprise, there sat Minnie Lee and Rev. Moore. The first words she said to him were, "Bob, you are going to start a Methodist church here in Lillian!!!

A few days later, Rev. Moore called to say that he was mailing a list of all of the known Methodists who lived in the Lillian area. Bob called the fourteen people on the list to get together and talk about what to do in order to get a church in Lillian. Some folks had joined other churches and some were just not interested; however, several did respond very favorably and were willing to attend a meeting.

July 7, 1980: The very first get together to plan for a new church was held at the Spanish Cove Club House, with a second meeting held shortly thereafter. At the first meeting a new list was made up of people who might be interested in a local church; they were called, and between the two meetings, they were the Founders of the Lillian United Methodist Church. Those attending were: Minnie Lee Prichett, Bob and Charlotte Donnenwirth, Geraldine Dunkerley, Margaret French, Cecil Wynn, Rufus Crosby, Grant and Laura Reinhardt, Donald and Ellen Sterrie. Attending from The First Methodist Church of Foley were Rev. Moore and Ed Hand, Director of Missions. It was decided to have a service once a month in Lillian with a goal of the first service being the first Sunday in August.

The next few weeks were a whirlwind of activities. Father Mark of St. Joseph Catholic Church assisted in loaning the "little green chapel." It had only 2 or 3 old pews along the sides, a non-working furnace, no water, no air conditioning, no bathrooms and a swarm of bees in the entrance way pillar. Rev. Bob Mackey, a retired Methodist preacher was located in Gulf Shores,

agreed to conduct the service. Cokesbury hymnals and altar cross were borrowed from Foley Methodist, folding metal chairs from the Lillian Volunteer Fire Department, a toy electric organ from Azolene Pickens. The pulpit consisted of two wooded footstools stacked and covered with a white cloth. A table was covered with Minnie's white linen tablecloth for the altar to hold a basket of flowers, a white bible and two candleholders from Charlotte Donnenwirth. A wicker basket was used for the offering plate. They were ready for the first service, but would anyone come????

August 3, 1980: We were hoping for about 15-20 attendees. Then the folks started to arrive: first, our organizers, then Rev. Mackey, then well wishers from other local churches, then there came a full busload of Sunday school and well-wishers from the Foley United Methodist Church. In all 65 Christian folks attended our very first church service here in Lillian. Problem: not to mention our aforementioned lack of amenities, now there were not enough seats or even standing room in the little green chapel. Many had to stand in the entryway with the honey bees.

September 1980: A second service was held and conducted by Rev. Mackey. Not with as many attendees this time, but mainly the core group, new members and visitors. A couple of days later there was a phone call from Rev. Henry Eddins, Pensacola District Superintendent, requesting a meeting with our folks as soon as possible. We accommodated him with an evening meeting later that week at the Lillian Volunteer Fire Dept. Perhaps the first question he asked was, "What type of Methodist church did we desire to become?" After a short discussion and clarification, we elected to become affiliated and a part of the United Methodist Church organization. He then pointedly informed us that it was his job to start new churches, then he thanked us for doing his job. He informed us that it was also his job to fill the pulpit. A month later, Rev. Eddins was the guest minister and after service he held a business meeting. It was then decided the services would be held each Sunday. He declared us a mission church under the Foley UMC. jurisdiction. Following that edict, he then appointed Rev. Moore to be our mission preacher and to hold weekly services. Thus, Rev. Moore was tasked to conduct sunrise services on the beach at Gulf Shores, then an eight o'clock service at Lillian, and then a ten o'clock service at Foley! Rev. Moore never got relief from this hectic circuit until June 1981.



Rev. Claude Keenam: 06/15/1981 - 06/15/1994

June 7, 1981: The Alabama-West Florida Conference assigned a preacher, and we welcomed our first full time minister, Reverend Claude Keenam and his wife Nina from Andalusia, Alabama.

Retired from the army in 1967, Claude worked as registration supervisor for the Tennessee Technological University in Cookeville, TN for over a year. He returned to his home state of Alabama and began teaching ROTC at Andalusia High School. He taught for 13 years, and it was during this time that he entered the ministry and served as a part-time Lay Pastor on the Opp Memorial Charge in the Andalusia District. He attended Candler School of Theology and Emory University in Atlanta and received his license to preach in 1974. He served Liberty UMC for five years and Macedonia UMC for four years. Lillian UMC was his first full time assignment.





September 13, 1981: Members of the year-old Lillian United Methodist Church don't have a building to meet in yet, so the congregation of St. Joseph's Catholic Church have allowed them to meet in their little green chapel on Highway 98. To express their gratitude for this kindness, the Methodists held a fish fry on Sunday and invited their Catholic friends. The fish was caught and cooked by several men of the congregation with the help of a Baptist or two, and the ladies furnished the rest. Here, both Catholics and Methodists pass through the line, ready to enjoy both food and fellowship.

In addition to being Pastor at LUMC, Rev. Keenam lead an early Sunday service for a group of "Snowbirds" at the Spanish Cove Clubhouse. By 1982 many of them, including Kenneth &

Alma Lohman, Gene & Lois Nida and LaVern & Velma Holtz became members of LUMC and were involved in the first years of the church.

September 20, 1981: The Sunday School services and Sunday evening services started.

September 23, 1981: The Wednesday evening services started.

January 4, 1982: Leadership Workshop attended by several LUMC members at Robertsdale Methodist Church.

January 15: 1982: Second Newsletter published.

February 14, 1982: First wedding for Lillian UMC. ▶


June 23-25, 1982: Three day revival, Rev. Ford officiating.

August 25, 1982: An extensive search for available land that met the requirements set forth by the District Superintendent of the Alabama-West Florida Conference, the culmination the long search for land on which to build our permanent church. Mr. Creel, Joe Dusek, Bill Harris, Cecil Wynn and the Preacher met at Harris Realty. A check from the Conference in the amount of \$45,000 was passed and The Lillian United Methodist Church had 5.9 acres of land located at corner of Highway 98 and Perdido Street on which to build God's house.



September 15, 1982: United Methodist Women held first meeting.





October 31 - November 4, 1982: Four day revival, Rev. Eddins officiating. The Rev. Henry Eddins of Montgomery, who served both the Robertsdale UMC and the Foley UMC and was the Pensacola District Superintendent for two years, returns to conduct a revival at the Lillian United Methodist Church. In 1980, it was Rev. Eddins who presented the charter to Lillian United Methodist Church.

Easter, April 3, 1983: The Easter Service was held on the new property where the shape of the future church was staked out on the upper end of the property.





Every one was bundled up like Eskimos. It was indeed a cold and blustery day. The temperature was close to freezing and the wind was swirling all around us, and within those stakes we held our very first service on our own property. Agnes Mason, our organist, almost froze her hands trying to play the portable organ. We sang our songs and the preacher gave a heart-felt sermon; but all the time he was entertaining us with the white wispy vapors from his breath. It seemed a long, long, long hour.

August 6, 1983: clean up day, getting ready for our first worship service in our own church.


August 7, 1983: first service in our own church. District Superintendent Clifford Abbott was here to bring the message. We had no air conditioning but several fans were set up. The attendance that day was 130. After worship service refreshments were served.

August 20, 1983: we cleaned out the little Chapel where God had blessed us so. We are in our new church building to stay.

From Reminiscences, Rev. Keenam

There was some hired help, but a number of people from the congregation pitched in to handle construction under the building supervisor Jodie Shell. By August of 1983, the third anniversary of the organization of the church, the congregation held services in the partially completed building and served refreshments to friends and neighbors following the service. Within two weeks, they left little catholic chapel which had been "their church" for almost 3 years and moved into the new building, although it was still not completed.







Ready for Service

It was March 1984 before the Lillian Volunteer Fire Department chairs were removed from the church and replaced with new pews which were placed on the carpet that had arrived several months before. Since church members gave of their time and money, costs were kept to a minimum: approximately \$110,000 had been spent on the building without a mortgage. It is valued at \$250,000. It houses a sanctuary, three classrooms, three restrooms and a pastor's office. There were many projects to help finance the building including successful rummage sales, which were held twice a year, the sale of men and women's caps, a chicken dinner and a spaghetti dinner. Members of churches all over the Alabama-West Florida Conference contributed close to \$5000 through the \$10 club and donations came from friends, neighbors, relatives, businesses and other churches. The Lillian community was very supportive of the church efforts, and many citizens expressed pride over the erection of a new church in the area.

On Easter Sunday (March 31, 1984) our church was formally dedicated with Rev. Clifford Abbott, Pensacola District Superintendent, as guest minister. "The Lord has blessed her church of people who have contributed their money, time and talents to provide a building where we can worship our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ," Rev. Keenam said. "During the special Easter services, we dedicated it to His glory."




Methodist Bicentennial Lillian United Methodist Church - 4th Birthday

The Parsonage

May 30, 1987 Bulletin

The finance committee met on April 7. It is the recommendation of the finance committee that we have \$50,000 cash on hand before we break ground for the Parsonage. This is approximately half of the cost of the building, furnishing and equipping the Parsonage to the standards recommended by the Alabama-West Florida conference. A goal thermometer and a drawing of the proposed parsonage are posted on the bulletin board. As you can see, we are approximately 1/4 there at \$12,559.23. Personal donations and fundraisers will be appreciated.

Rufus Crosby, the Building Committee Chair, said that the basic costs of the house was \$64,800. A loan was secured from the Alabama-West Florida United Methodist Development Fund, Inc., a new fundraising organization to provide low-interest loans for new and developing churches. EB Williams Inc. of Pensacola began construction on November 17, 1987, and the minister is expected to move in by April 1. Fundraising dinners, bake and craft sales are sponsored monthly by the United Methodist Women.

Parsonage: The holidays and weather have slowed, but not stopped, progress of the Parsonage. A permanent roof, windows and doors are in place; basic wiring and plumbing have been completed; sheet rock has been delivered to be installed on the interior walls and ceilings; and the outside is ready for brick and painting. Now it looks like Valentine's Day before we see a Parsonage near completion. That is good, and we appreciate everyone's support and confidence. The contractor has done an excellent job so far, and we expect him to continue to do so. From the building committee.

March 13, 1988 Open House

Open house was held Sunday, March 13 at the new three bedroom brick Parsonage of the Lillian United Methodist Church. Refreshments were served by the United Methodist women. The 2206 square foot house, with another 755 square foot two-car garage and storage area, has a pastor study, paneled family room, living room, dining room, utility room, two full-size bathrooms and a half bath. It also has a concrete patio at the rear entrance and a porch with columns in the front. There is a paved walk in front and a paved driveway. It is carpeted with the exception of the bathrooms, kitchen and entrance hall. The United Methodist Women furnished the drapes and drapery hardware, and the United Methodist Men have been doing yard work and planting shrubbery.



History of the Fellowship/Education Building



During the spring of 1989 the congregation of The Lillian United Methodist Church decided to act on the need for additional facilities to meet the needs of the growing congregation. It was obvious that the new parsonage would soon be paid for, but we needed Sunday school classrooms, we needed office space and we needed activity rooms. Our Youth Program was growing, and we needed space for our children and youth.

At a special board meeting on July 20, 1989, a Building Committee was approved to plan and oversee the construction of the new facility. Mr. Bob Donnenwirth was named Chairman of the Building Committee. Mr. Don Waite, the architect for the Church building, served as a consultant to the committee and prepared the preliminary plans. Objectives: Meet needs of the congregation and keep the cost under \$150,000.

- February 15, 1990 the church dissolved the parsonage fund since the parsonage was paid for and established the Fellowship/Education Building Fund.
- August 28, 1990 the committee reviewed the preliminary plans, and instructed Mr. Waite to proceed with plans.
- March 23, 1991 the congregation approved the preliminary plans.
- April 3, 1991 the District Board of Church Locations approved the plans.

The final plans were developed and the cost was estimated at \$180,000. It was decided not to begin construction until the church had a minimum of \$75,000 in the construction fund and to delay the finishing inside the activity room. On December 31, 1991 the construction fund balance reached its' goal. The Board authorized the Trustees to borrow \$115,000 for this construction and on January 26, 1992 ground was broken. Builder selected: Ray Wiggins.





The Second Decade: Change & Growth

Rev. Cathy Allen: 06/15/1994 - 10/31/1997



Rev. Cathy Allen was appointed by the Alabama/West Florida Conference of the United Methodist Church as pastor in Lillian beginning June 15, 1994. Prior to her appointment to Lillian, Allen pastored two small congregations in the Milton, FL area. She made the move to Lillian with her husband, Ron and two children, Jason, 10, and Tiffany, 8. A native of Muncie, IN who grew up in Gulf Breeze, FL, Allen said her interest in the ministry began with her activity in student ministries like puppet shows and camps while attending Troy State University. At the time, there were only a few female Methodist ministers. With the encouragement of her father, she pursued the ministry. After graduation from Troy she enrolled in seminary at Emory University in Atlanta. Allen said the lack of female role models in the ministry frees her to be herself:

"Being myself seems to work with people. I go in and love them, care for them and teach them God's word. That's what they want."

Following 13 years with the same pastor, it is inevitable there is a sense of change with a new pastor. Pastor Cathy started a time of growth and beginning October 1, 1995 LUMC started offering two services; an informal service of singing and spiritual message at 8 am or attend our traditional service with choir and sermon at 11 am.



From a Pastor's Desk: Rev. Cathy Allen, LUMC October 22, 1995

As of this writing, two hurricanes have already struck our community and we are keeping a close eye on a third. Since coming to serve as pastor of LUMC in June of 1994 I have experienced (in addition to the hurricanes) two Mullet Festivals, two Watermelon Festivals, a Christmas parade, Costal Cleanup, food drives, Lock-up for Literacy and countless church dinners at the Community Club. I have learned to honk my horn and/or wave when I drive by someone on the street or in their yard - even if I don't personally know them . . . I have been the recipient of care, compassion and prayers during illness from people I did not even know. 
Rev. Gene A. May: 01/01/1998 - 06/15/2001

Across the top of the website was our name, Lillian United Methodist Church, address, and phone number. A picture of Church came up on the first page of the website, with the words 'Welcome to our family!' scrolling across the screen. Down the left hand side of the screen was a column of available pages. The weekly schedule of worship services, children and youth activities. There was a short biography for the pastor on a page. There was a 'Welcome page' written by Gene May. There was a map and driving directions to find us. Pictures of VBS and Youth activities each had a page. There were pages of information for the UM Women, Our Mission Statement, Community Dinners, how to contact us by email and When is Easter? So that the website would change every day it had a link to the Daily Christian Cartoon website. My favorite was a page called 'God's Yellow Pages.' This page had links to various verses by topic. The page was meant to connect people to God's word and be a direct help to their lives. In my mind the church needs to be active. So, I created the 'Action page. There were fourteen 'Action Opportunities' listed on the page. The scrolling message on the page was, 'We can use your talents!' Some of the opportunities were directly related to church like: if play the piano or play a musical instrument or if you sing or want to sing a solo. Donate money to missions through the United Methodist Church. 100% of the money goes where you designate. The church picks up the administrative costs. Some opportunities were community orientated. Donate food or clothing to church or volunteer at food bank or clothing store or nursing home. LUMC Fund-Raiser Dinners - Do they Live or Die?

The LUMC dinners started approximately 17 years ago who this church decided to have our own parsonage instead of renting a house for our pastor to live in. Apparently, the powers-that-be thought that the parsonage would pay for itself since we wouldn't be paying rent to someone else. Mr. and the first Mrs. Replogle (Betty) initiated the idea and organized our dinners to raise money to pay down our debt as quickly as possible, especially since Betty Replogle had enough faith in LUMC and our community to sign her name on the mortgage herself!

The fund-raiser dinner proceeds were used to pay additional monies each month on the mortgage principle and we were able to pay off a \$40,000 mortgage in 2 ½ years. Even though the parsonage was free of debt, we continued with our monthly dinners and set aside enough money so that when our education/fellowship hall was built, we only had a mortgage of \$135,000 which was paid off in under 5 years. Of course, there were monetary gifts from the congregation that also helped.

So how important are these dinners? We have a good history of providing a delicious dinner at a reasonable cost and we have faithful members of our community that support. So WHERE is that ONE special MEMBER of the LUMC congregation that can LEAD a TEAM of faithful workers to RAISE \$2000. on one Sunday morning each month October through April?

A Disaster Response Team was formed in 2012 to provide the church and community support in a hurricane or other natural disaster with emergency preparedness plans, supplies and assistance in the aftermath.

Although the church has had a Safe Sanctuary policy, a team was added in 2012.

- ▶ The United Methodist Men, active in our church since its inception, were re-chartered by President Bill Duncan on April 16, 2012. In 2013, Car Show Coordinators Ken and Diane Robinson turned the task over to the UMM.
- ▶ LUMC participated in the AWF Conference 90 Days of Prayer Initiative during September-November 2012 with weekly prayer meetings lead by Pastor Daniel. The focus was to pray about how God can develop new communities of faith through them. This can take many formsnew churches, second campuses, new discipling group, and so on.

- ▶ Prayer Team updates include printing Prayer Concerns in the Sunday bulletin. National Day of Prayer was observed with a service in May 2012. World Day of Prayer was observed in March 2013 with guest speaker Pastor Joe Aldrete from Foley.
- ▶ The Prayer Shawl Ministry was started in September 2012. The group knit or crochet shawls which are then blessed by the pastor and congregation. Presented to those in need of comfort, a prayer shawl can cover a person in peace, prayer, healing and grace.




